♦ BEE CAUSES TRAFFIC ACCIDENT

A bee is being blamed for a crash involving a car and a bicycle on East Madison Ave. near Slack Rd. in Athens last Thursday afternoon. Tyson Maurice Brewer told police he was driving along East Madison when a bee flew in the window and landed on his face. He said when he swatted at the bee, he must have jerked the steering wheel, and his vehicle struck Heather Rose Humphrey as she was riding her bicycle along the side of the street. She was treated at Athens Regional Medical Center for non-life threatening injuries.

♦ TWC HEADED TO WORLD SERIES

The Tennessee Wesleyan College baseball team is headed to the NAIA World Series for the first time. The Bulldogs will play Embry-Riddle this coming Friday in Lewiston, Idaho. TWC is one of 10 teams that made it to the series. The Bulldogs' record is 46 wins and 16 losses. They made it to the World Series thanks to a 12-11 win over Southern Polytechnic last Friday.

• BP officials say the tube being used to siphon leaking oil in the Gulf of Mexico is not working as effectively as it did at first. Meantime, three top Obama administration officials are returning to the Gulf Coast to monitor the massive oil spill.

◆ A Honolulu city councilman has defeated two Democrats to give Republicans a midterm election victory in the U.S. congressional district where President Obama grew up. Charles Djou's win is the latest triumph for the GOP as it looks to regain control of Congress.

• Authorities say a man led Border Patrol agents on a 100-mile chase from the U.S.-Mexico border into Southern California before the driver and six suspected undocumented immigrants stopped and surrendered in Irvine.

◆ Investigators searching for clues as to what caused India's worst air disaster in more than a decade have recovered the cockpit voice recorder and flight data recorder from the charred remains of an Air India flight. The plane crashed Saturday while landing at Mangalore International Airport, killing 158 people. There were 8 survivors.

• A new study says children who eat or drink probiotic yogurt daily have 18 to 24% fewer coughs, stomach aches, and infections. Probiotic yogurt contains beneficial bacteria.
