DEMOLITION STARTS FOR FOOD CITY

Demolition has begun on some of the buildings in the Madison Park Shopping Center to make way for the new Food City supermarket. The first building to go is the former Badcock Furniture building pictured below. Athens Utilities Board will be relocating sewer lines, and that will require some street closings. Hill Street will be closed from Young Street to Bank Street beginning April 3rd, and continuing through May 1st. Park Street will be closed from Hill Street to White Street...Church Street will be closed from Bank Street to Park Street...and Glendale Street will be closed from Hill Street to Park Street from April 4th through April 12th.

◆ President Donald Trump's eldest daughter, Ivanka Trump, announced yesterday that she will take an official position in her father's administration. Ivanka Trump will be a special assistant to the president but will not receive any salary.

◆ United Kingdom Prime Minister Theresa May has triggered Article 50, formally starting the process for Britain to leave the European Union. The U.K. will have to pay the EU when it finally leaves the union, which will be subject to negotiations.

◆ After spending weeks supporting and lobbying for a Republican-backed health care plan, President Donald Trump told a gathering of U.S. senators Tuesday night that they were "going to make a deal on health care."
