◆ BELL SEEKING SENATE MAJORITY LEADER POSITION

State Senator Mike Bell of Riceville is said to be eying the post of Senate Majority Leader. The current majority leader, Mark Norris of Collierville, has been nominted by President Trump to fill a U.S. District Court judgeship in West Tennessee. If that happens, both Bell and Senator Jack Johnson of Franklin would like to have the majority leader position. Bell and Johnson consider themselves to be great friends. The contest appears to already be getting underway. After Johnson gave pens engraved with their names to the 28 members of the GOP caucus, Bell struck back by providing bowls of spicy bear and deer sausage balls to his colleagues. Bell is an avid hunter. Both Bell and Johnson say they're content to let Norris, whose term as majority leader extends through 2018, to remain there because their candidacies are based on his departure.

Measles Alert for Chicago O'Hare Travelers!

If you have traveled through the Chicago O'Hare airport, be forewarned that a measles alert was issued four days after an air passenger, who was diagnosed with the highly contagious virus passed, through two terminals at Chicago O'Hare International Airport. A statement issued by the Illinois Department of Public Health stated that on January 10th, some time between 6:30 a.m. and 1 p.m., "a passenger on an international flight with a confirmed case of measles arrived in Terminal 5 of the airport and the person departed on a domestic flight from Terminal 1." The statement warned that the passenger "was infectious that day" and "may have traveled to other parts of the airport."

Today In History ~ January 16th

1853 - André Michelin, the French industrialist who first mass-produced rubber automobile tires, was born.

1910 - Baseball player Dizzy Dean was born. He wasn't given the name, Dizzy, at his birth on this day in 1910; but was named Jay Hanna Dean. Jay gained the reputation of being dizzy because of his malapropisms, used frequently in his later years. He was a star pitcher for the St. Louis Cardinals during the 1930's and later became a popular radio sportscaster.

1939 - The shrill siren call of radio's I Love a Mystery was heard for the first time as the show debuted on NBC's West-Coast outlets.

1943 - Country singer Ronnie Millsap was born. His many hits include "What A Difference You've Made In My Life" and "Smoky Mountain Rain."

1961 - Mickey Mantle signed a contract which made him the highest paid baseball player in the American League. 'The Commerce Comet' stepped up to the plate for \$75,000 for the 1961 season. Over in the National League, Willie 'Say Hey' Mays, was making more money than any baseball player. He had a contract for \$85,000.
