
◆ NASA is launching a mission called Parker Solar Probe to get closer than its ever gotten before to the sun. The mission will launch Saturday.

TODAY IN HISTORY - AUGUST 9th

1854 - Henry David Thoreau published "Walden," which described his experiences living near Walden Pond in Massachusetts.

1945 - The United States exploded a nuclear device over Nagasaki, Japan, instantly killing an estimated 39,000 people. The bombing came three days after Hiroshima was bombed.

1963 - Singer Whitney Houston was born. Her biggest hit records include "The Greatest Love Of All" and "I Will Always Love You."

1969 - Actress Sharon Tate and four other people were found murdered in Los Angeles. Cult leader Charles Manson and a group of his followers were later convicted of the crimes.

1974 - President Richard Nixon's resignation became effective at noon, and Vice President Gerald Ford was sworn in as the nation's 38th President.
