◆ Amid protests, President Trump and first lady, Melania, along with the president's son-in-law Jared Kushner and daughter Ivanka Trump, visited Pittsburgh's Tree of Life synagogue Tuesday afternoon in the wake of the massacre at the house of worship this weekend that left 11 people dead. The president and first lady also visited the victims of the shooting at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center.

◆ The U.S. military is preparing to send an additional 5,200 troops to the nation's southern border ahead of a migrant caravan travelling towards the region. The caravan is reportedly moving about 25 miles per day and must travel around 1,000 miles to reach the nearest U.S. border crossing at McAllen, Texas.
