◆ ATHENS CITY COUNCIL UPDATE

The Athens City Council held its monthly meeting this past Tuesday evening. The council gave final approval by a vote of 4 to 1 to the City's budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The budget does not contain any tax or fee increases.

- Police Chief Cliff Couch reported there were 61 thefts in May, 12 assaults, six burglaries, six vehicle thefts, and one sex offense. Officers wrote citations for 164 moving violations. There were 98 traffic accidents with 20 injuries. Chief Couch reported that the police department is at full staff with no vacancies.
- Fire Chief Brandon Ainsworth reported that Athens firefighters responded to 70 calls in May. Losses totaled \$75,400.



TODAY IN HISTORY - JUNE 20th

1863 - West Virginia became the 35th state. It was originally part of Virginia, which had seceded from the Union during the Civil War. The western counties in Virginia supported the North and declared their independence from Virginia. Eventually, they became West Virginia.

1867 - The U.S. purchased the territory of Alaska from Russia for \$7 million, or about 2¢ per acre.

1924 - Certified Guitar Picker Chet Atkins was born.

1939 - W2XBS (later WCBS-TV) in New York City televised the first TV operetta. *Pirates of Penzance*, composed by Gilbert and Sullivan, was presented to a very small viewing audience. Television was a new, experimental medium at the time.

1945 - Singer Anne Murray was born in Canada. Her first big hit was "Snowbird."

1949 - Singer Lionel Richie was born. He was the lead singer of the Commodores before going solo. Among his hit records, "Say You, Say Me."

1977 - Oil began flowing through the 789-mile-long Alaska pipeline.
