### **Tax Referendum Answers**

Athens City Manager C. Seth Sumner and Athens Director of Schools Dr. Melanie Miller appeared on WYXI Radio Monday morning to answer questions about the Athens Sales Tax Referendum. Among the answers:

If the referendum passes, work would move ahead on a new building at City Park School at a cost of approximately \$39 million. The projected move-in date would be the fall of 2022. The schools would receive around 60% of the revenue from the sales tax increase. The Athens property tax would



also be increased by a minimum of 15%, and that money would also go to the schools.

If the referendum fails, Dr. Miller says it would be very difficult for the school project to move

forward. In that case, the school system would look at other options including renovations at the current buildings and reducing expenses. Sumner said there are no plans at this point to raise property taxes if the referendum fails.

# A Minute of History With Joe Guy

Joe Guy is not only the McMinn County Sheriff; he is also the McMinn County Historian. He has prepared a series of vignettes about McMinn County's history that are aired daily on WYXI Radio, AM-1390 and FM-94.5, during this Bicentennial Year. We will also publish them in The Morning Fax. Here is installment Number One:

McMinn County was formed in November of 1819 out of Cherokee lands obtained through the Calhoun Treaty. Long used as hunting lands by the Cherokee, the area had first been seen by whites who traded with the Indians and by men serving in the militia that fought against the Cherokee in 1776. Lying in a huge valley interspersed with low ridges and numerous free-flowing creeks, the area was inviting to those settlers who hoped to farm, cut timber, or operate water-powered mills. In March 1820, the county government, or county court at it was then known, was organized in Calhoun in the home of Cherokee landowner Major John Walker, with county officials chosen that included Spencer Beavers as Sheriff, Young Colville as Court Clerk, Archibald Turk as Trustee, and Benjamin Hambright as Register. Two hundred years later, McMinn County continues its legacy of providing a good place for its citizens to live. The only debt-free county in Tennessee, McMinn County continues to be an example of responsible commerce and good government.
