ENGLEWOOD GETS SEWER GRANT

Governor Bill Lee has approved over \$26.7million in Community Development Block Grants which assist communities with infrastructure improvements, housing rehabilitations, and health and safety initiatives. Sixty-six communities received grants. The City of Englewood will receive \$348,285 for Sewer System Improvements. Monroe County will get \$315,000 for EMS Improvements. Tellico Plains will be getting \$525,000 for Water Line Extensions.

More History from Joe Guy

A monument on the lawn of the Etowah Depot recognizes one of the most highly decorated military units in World War 1, the 3rd Battalion of the 117th Infantry, made up in large part from men hailing from Etowah in Company L, and those from Athens in Company I.

Company L of the 117th was organized as a National Guard Unit in Etowah in 1910. Captain D.W. Lillard became its commanding officer in 1912, and the unit first saw action in 1916, assisting in the hunt for the outlaw Pancho Villa near the Mexican border.

But as World War I escalated in 1917, the 117th was called into active service and sent to Europe in May 1918. That year, Company L served in some of the toughest fighting in Belgium, Ypers-Lys, in the Somme Offensive, and was instrumental in breaking the Hindenburg Line that September. For their bravery and efforts, the McMinn County men were awarded 3 Medals of Honor, Sixteen Distinguished Service Crosses, and many British and French military honors.

The monument at the Etowah Depot was dedicated in 1922, and remains as a testament to these brave local soldiers of the 117^{th} .

1784 - Thomas Hastings (Composer) was born. He composed the music to the hymn, "Rock of Ages."

1917 - Gertrude Zelle, the most notorious spy of World War One, was executed by a firing squad. She was known by the name, Mata Hari.

1928 - The German dirigible Graf Zeppelin arrived in the United States on its first commercial flight after a four-and-a-half-day trip across the Atlantic.

1938 - Singer Marv Johnson was born. His biggest hit record was "You Got What It Takes" in 1959.
