Athens City Council Update

The Athens City Council held its monthly meeting Tuesday. At the meeting, Councilman John Coker announced his resignation. Coker was elected in 2016. He lives outside the Athens city limits and is no longer eligible to serve.

At the meeting, the police and fire department heads reported on activity for June.

- Police Chief Cliff Couch reported there were 43 thefts in June, 18 assaults, 12 burglaries, 8 motor vehicle thefts, 3 robberies, and 3 sex offenses. Officers issued 81 traffic citations. There were 55 traffic accidents in June with 14 injuries. Chief Couch reported there are 4 vacancies on the police
- Fire Chief Brandon Ainsworth reported that firefighters responded to 84 calls in June. Four calls were to fires, 53 for rescue and emergency medical service, and there were 17 false alarms. Total loses were \$6,500.00.

Early Voting Continues

Early voting for the August 6th primary continues through August 1st. In McMinn County you can vote early at the Election Commission office on the ground floor of the Courthouse or at the Conference Center at Athens Regional Park. When you arrive, you will be given a "voter packet" containing an ink pen, gloves, and an "I Voted" sticker. After checking in, you will go into the voting room where you will be given a 5-digit number and a piece of paper with a black arrow on it. Voting machines are no longer being used. Instead, you use a "Ballot Marking Device." Election officials will show you how the device works. You insert the paper with the arrow into the machine, vote by touching the screen, and when you are finished, your vote is printed on that piece of paper. You then take the paper over to another machine called the "ballot box" and scan your ballot into that machine. That concludes the voting process. Face masks are encouraged but not required.

CORONAVIRUS UPDATE

In the past 24 hours, the number of COVID-19 cases in Tennessee has jumped another 2,473, standing at 84,417 total cases to date. The death toll is 888, up 17 since Wednesday.

U.S. equities ended the day mixed. Utilities was the bestperforming sector. Energy was the worst. White House officials are considering an extension of current unemployment benefits because it's unlikely they will reach a deal on the new stimulus package before existing benefits expire.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average was up 165 points or 0.6% to 27,006. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was up 19 points or 0.6% to 3,276, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was up 26 points or 0.2% to 10,706.

TODAY IN HISTORY - JULY 23rd

1829 - The first typewriter was patented — by William Burt of Mt. Vernon, MI. It didn't work out as well as other practical models developed years later. The first problem was, people couldn't get used to calling it a Burtwriter.

1904 - The ice cream cone was independently introduced at the St. Louis World's Fair by Ernest A. Hamwi, a Syrian concessionaire.
