Pedestrian Killed in Athens

A Riceville man was struck and killed on S. White Street in Athens last Saturday night. Police were dispatched to the area around 8 p.m. On arrival, they found a McMinn County deputy rendering aid to a man in the middle of the street. Athens Fire Department and Emergency Medical Services also responded. However, the man succumbed to his injuries and was dead at the scene. He was identified as Bryan Teasley, 54. Based on interviews with witnesses, Athens Police Chief Cliff Couch says it appears the victim walked out in front of an oncoming car. The driver of the vehicle remained on the scene and cooperated with the investigation.
