

TUESDAY'S MARKET REPORT: U.S. equities finished higher Tuesday, following a sizable rally on Monday. There were no major data announcements, keeping the market's focus on the Fed, with stocks enduring a wide swing over the previous few trading days as investors have attempted to square the strong economy with the Fed's future policy shift to address higher inflation. Consistent with the modest move in the broad indexes, sectors traded in a tight band, with consumer discretionary and energy leading while 10-year rates were little changed, hovering just below 1.50%. At the closing bell: DJIA 33,945.58 (+68.61); S&P 500 4,246.44 (+21.65); NASDAQ 14,253.27 (+111.79).

TODAY IN HISTORY - JUNE 23rd

- **1812** Britain, unaware that America had declared war against it five days earlier, rescinded its policy on neutral shipping, a major issue of contention between the two countries.
- **1845** The congress of the Republic of Texas agreed to be annexed by the United States.
- **1868 -** Christopher L. Sholes of Wisconsin patented his type-writer. A Mr. Remington later turned it into a more practical typewriter. Shole's version was a little cumbersome. It was about as big as a desk. And it didn't have any correcting ribbon. The writer didn't need any since the paper was hidden inside the huge typewriter so you couldn't see any typos until after the fact.
- 1929 Country singer June Carter Cash was born. She later became the wife of singer Johnny Cash. She died in 2003.
- **1931** A young couple, who unknowingly would become the royal family of the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing, married today. Anne Bledsoe and William 'Bill' Henry Getty France tied the knot. Together, they built NAS-CAR into the largest sanctioning organization of auto racing in the world.
- **1972 -** President Nixon signed into law Title IX, which barred discrimination on the basis of sex for "any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."
- **1973 -** Watergate special prosecutor Archibald Cox subpoenaed President Richard Nixon to obtain tape recordings of White House conversations about the Watergate break-in.
