### **Date Set for Adjourned Council Session**

The date has been set for the reconvening of the adjourned Special Session of the Athens City Council. The special session was called to deal with issues involving City Manager C. Seth Sumner and Police Chief Cliff Couch. The Council met to ask questions and hear testimony from both Sumner and Couch two weeks ago on August 10th. After six hours, the meeting was adjourned with several more items on the agenda yet to be discussed, including details involving the arrest of Sumner for having a handgun in his carry-on bag at the Knoxville Airport.

The Special meeting will reconvene next Monday, August 30th, at 5:30 p.m. in the Burkett Witt Council Chambers at the Athens Municipal Building. The first meeting dealt with issues surrounding two Nest cameras which disappeared and then mysteriously reappeared. The City Manager also denied retaliating against Chief Couch or any other city employees. The meeting adjourned as Couch asked for an opportunity to respond to a list of criticisms made by Sumner of his performance as police chief. Couch was not allowed to respond.

NOTE: The Athens City Council will hold another Council Night Out event at 6 p.m. this evening at the McMinn Senior Activity Center, located at 205 McMinn Avenue, Athens. This will give citizens of Athens an opportunity to meet with council members one-on-one to ask questions and/or offer suggestions to them on ways to improve the city.
