State Senate Advances Legislation

Last week, the Tennessee Senate advanced several bills to increase penalties for criminals, specifically repeat offenders and criminals who target children. State Senator Lowe of Calhoun, brought forth a bill that empowers intrastate commerce in Tennessee and strengthens Tennessee's response to repeat misdemeanor offenders. To address the issue of persistent crime, Tennessee lawmakers are prioritizing solutions to tackle the challenge of repeat misdemeanor offenders who often avoid significant consequences. Senator Bo Watson of Hixson passed Senate Bill 2155 in the Senate Judiciary Committee which would increase the minimum jail time following a fifth qualifying misdemeanor offense. The list includes 37 total crimes ranging from assault to driving under the influence. Under this legislation, a criminal who has been convicted of any combination of five or more qualifying misdemeanors in the past ten years would be subject to a class E felony charge at the discretion of a judge. In the case of certain repeat violent offenses such as domestic assault and child neglect, the legislation would raise the third or subsequent conviction from a class D misdemeanor to a class E felony. A Class E felony is punishable by up to six years in prison and a fine of up to \$3,000. "There are hundreds, if not thousands, of repeat misdemeanor offenders across the state of Tennessee," said Watson. "They are habitual criminals, and the public is tired of them getting off with a simple 'slap on the wrist.' This legislation is one remedy we should consider to curb criminal recidivism." 

Lisa Dotson Passes The Hard Hat

Lisa Dotson has passed the hard hat of revitalization and renovations of Historic Downtown Athens to new director, Sandra Kinney. Lisa has served as the Director of Main Street Athens since its inception in 2016 but decided to pursue another opportunity in August of 2023. After announcing her resignation, Lisa remained in the position to ensure a smooth transition until a new director was in place; she will now serve as a consultant for the program. The Main Street Board of Directors welcomed Sandra Kinney during a recent board meeting, and she will officially begin her role in April. Sandra and her husband, Mike, moved to Tennessee from Georgia in 2016 and she immediately became actively involved in the Kiwanis Club, The Athens Arts Center, and McMinn County Living Heritage Museum. Sandra worked in higher education in Georgia for many years and is experienced in strategic planning, workforce development, data collection & analysis and grant management. In her spare time, she enjoys exploring other communities and their downtowns. Sandra has a passion for tourism and finding ways to enhance communities and their people. "Although the development of downtown Athens has been my baby for the past eight years, I feel comfortable passing the hat to Sandra and our amazing board of directors," states Dotson. "The search committee spent numerous hours trying to find the right person who we felt would build upon the current foundation and carry the program to the next level, so we are thrilled to have found Sandra and her level of expertise" states Marilyn Miller, Search Committee Chair. Being an accredited national program since 2016, Main Street Athens has received grant funding in the amount of \$225,000 to support façade improvements for thirty-two downtown buildings, \$100,000 to enhance operations and entrepreneurial programs for The LITE House Innovation Center which Lisa served as Associate Director for four years, \$24,000 for the upgrades of a vacant space on North Jackson Street which is now known as Pocket Park, \$6,000 to design and install signs throughout downtown and develop a self-guided historic walking tour, \$6,000 towards the historical marker that was installed at J.L. Cook Memorial Park, \$1,500 for the mural/marque at Pocket Park and most recently able to secure \$327,000 for the development of the community kitchen incubator that will serve as a multi-facet co-working space for food and beverage entrepreneurs. With the plethora of changes throughout downtown the first-floor vacancy rate has changed from 40% when the program started to 10%. "People are excited about opening businesses in downtown!" states business owner and Board Chair, Lisa Mayfield. "Although we have managed to gain funding for projects from regional, state, and private foundations, we are very thankful of the financial support from the City of Athens, McMinn County, downtown business partners, and community friends. We encourage others to join in the campaign to support the development of our flourishing downtown district." Main Street Athens works in collaboration with other organizations throughout the year to provide fami-



ly-friendly events for the community, including Friendly City Festivals, The Arts Center, and the City of Athens Parks & Recreation Department. Deb Wallace, City Manager, who also serves as a board member shares, "We are delighted that Sandra considered being our new Main Street Director. She brings a wealth of knowledge and positive spirit to Athens, and we are excited to start exploring more ways to enhance our beautiful city. Lisa Dotson has paved the way for Main Street Athens, and we know that Sandra will have an easy transition. Please help us welcome her to "The Friendly City." Main Street Athens is a 501c3 non-profit organization under the umbrella of Main Street America. Athens has been a national accredited program since its inception in 2016 with the goal of preservation and revitalization of the downtown commercial district.
