TWU extends President Forrest's Contract through 2030

Tennessee Wesleyan University has extended President Dr. Tyler Forrest's contract through June 2030, following a unanimous vote by the Board of Trustees at its April 25 meeting. Dr. Bobby Goodfriend, Board Chair, praised Forrest's leadership, citing record enrollment, improved finances, and successful fundraising efforts since Forrest became president in 2022.

Under Forrest's leadership, the university has launched major campus improvements, including residence hall renovations, expansion of the dental hygiene program, and the creation of new athletic facilities and academic programs. A key highlight is the \$27 million *We Are Wesleyan* Capital Campaign, which has surpassed multiple fundraising goals.

Forrest also helped secure the largest campus expansion in over 40 years through a lease of the former Ingleside School property, which will house new athletic facilities. His tenure has also seen the university rise in national rankings, adopt a new logo, and increase access to education through the TWU Pledge, a scholarship initiative for low-income families.

A McMinn County native and TWU's youngest-ever president, Forrest expressed gratitude for the opportunity to continue serving his hometown institution alongside his family. Before joining TWU, he held leadership roles at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

Fire Damages Home in Madisonville; <u>Multiple Agencies</u> Respond



A fire that broke out in a double-wide mobile home on Pleasant Drive prompted a swift mutual aid response from multiple fire departments Wednesday evening.

The blaze was reported

around 5:30 p.m. after the homeowners, who were working in their garden, noticed smoke coming from the residence. The fire is believed to have started in the kitchen area, near the cook stove.





Walker Valley Varsity Mustangs got on the board in the top of the second inning after Hayden Harrison hit a sacrifice fly, and Brody Ownby laid down a sacrifice bunt, each scoring one run.

Marshall Goodner started the game for McMinn County Varsity Cherokees. The pitcher allowed eight hits and six runs (two earned) over six innings, striking out four and walking three. Titus Torbett led things off on the mound for Walker Valley Varsity Mustangs. The southpaw allowed four hits and one run over seven innings, striking out 10 and walking one.

Linc Brazzell, McMinn County Varsity Cherokees's number nine hitter, led the team with two hits in two at-bats.

Walker Valley Varsity Mustangs tallied nine hits in the game. Ownby went 3-for-3 at the plate to lead Walker Valley Varsity Mustangs in hits. Torbett collected two hits for Walker Valley Varsity Mustangs in four at bats. Walker Valley Varsity Mustangs were sure-handed in the field and didn't commit a single error. Jordan Smith had the most chances in the field with 10.

Vehicle Fire and Minor Injuries Reported in Two-Car Collision in Etowah
